

#### **Executive Director** & President Report

As a charity, CCRC is nothing if not nimble. As the needs of our community changes, so do our programs and services.

As we finished up the second year of providing services within the context of Covid we have learned, grown and adapted to reflect the needs of our clients. Services have been provided virtually, by phone, outside and in-person as safety allows.

Later in this report you will see that along with the various ways services have been provided—our programs themselves have changed. The Housing Resource Centre underwent many changes this past year, shifting focus and developing new staff roles. The Professional Counselling program expanded services and created a new role to reflect the needs of the staff. We were pleased to welcome Adina Muskat into the newly created role of Clinical Team Lead. Adina was in the position of Clinical Counsellor previously and took on additional clinical responsibilities as she accepted this position. Our Fundraising and Communications program has adapted as well, increasing our social media presence, redesigning Juke Box Mania and looking ahead to new ways to engage with donors and the community.

The Professional Counselling program has undergone many changes in the 2021-2022 year in order to adapt to the ever-uncertain times that the past few years have brought our community. We continue to offer a blend of in-person, virtual and telephone counselling in order to meet the diverse needs of the community. It is no surprise that the need for mental health support is more in demand than ever, and this has certainly been reflected at CCRC.

It has been a year of significant growth, as we have expanded our counselling services to individuals in Northumberland County. We have also recently taken over the Healing From Within program, previously offered through the John Howard Society, which supports men who have experienced sexual harm. We are thrilled to be able to expand our services to meet the ongoing mental health needs of the community.

Our staffing team has also experienced some significant transitions. Anna Field and Peter Marrocco both moved on from the agency after over 15 years of combined service. We have certainly missed their presence this year and cannot begin to express the gratitude towards their contributions over their time here. We have welcomed Emily Buckley as our Intake and Single Session Therapy Counsellor, Ruth Anne Devereaux, Rhea Eady, Thomas McVeigh and Lori Montgomery as Clinical Counsellors on the team.

As we continue to support the community I want to extend my deepest gratitude to the entire counselling team. In addition to the staff mentioned above, I want to thank Diane Caldwell, Beth Pink, Sarah Tucker and Emily Rogers Nannarone. As we are all aware, everyone has been impacted over the past three years, frontline workers and helping professionals are no exception. I am in continuous awe of your ongoing flexibility, resilience, humour and care that you provide to our clients and one another.



This past year HRC faced one of our biggest challenges yet: a complete transformation of the services we provide and the way we provide them.

After almost a decade of administering the Housing Stability Fund and various Rent Supplement programs on behalf of the City of Peterborough, we wrapped up those programs at HRC and shifted administration over to the City. We are grateful to the City for the opportunity to have administered those funds, and thankful also, for the opportunity to think deeply and creatively about where our strengths lie, what services our clients and community need, and how best we could provide them.



HRC has always been and will remain a prevention-focused service guided by our unwavering belief that housing is a human right. In support of these core values, we focused our services on **four main areas:** 

- We enhanced our Eviction Prevention and Housing Retention work, which prevents homelessness by keeping people housed.
- We re-opened our Drop-In Housing Help Clinic, which provides on-the-spot housing help to anyone experiencing a housing-related problem.
- We expanded our capacity to provide Community Education that empower tenants with the knowledge, skills and tools they need to resolve a housing crisis.
- We embarked on a brand new project, our Home Together initiative, led by a Housing Locator who connects with local landlords who want to contribute to positive change in our community by moving people into housing from homelessness.

The Community Service Orders program has embraced an exciting new opportunity to revise the referral model and to provide an expanded range of CCRC services to clients of the Peterborough Probation and Parole Office.

As ever, our biggest strength is our staff. Thank you to: Andrea Holtrust, Housing Help Clinic Coordinator & Community Service Orders Coordinator; Auden Palmer, Housing Counsellor; and Leigh Carrod, Housing Counsellor. For many people in Peterborough, that catalyst is the connection with our services. The situations many people in our community face are heartbreaking, difficult and complex, a direct reflection or even an amplification of the challenges that our community and so many more across the province and country are grappling with.

Fred Rogers once said: 'When I would see scary things in the news, my mother would say to me, "Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping." Our staff are those people, who walk with clients to listen and explore options. Sometimes that's all they can do, other times they can help a person navigate processes, applications, and systems to find real, long-term, life-changing solutions.

This work couldn't be possible without our donors, supporters and partner organizations, those who donate to our cause, amplify our messages, work with us toward a common goal and most importantly, share with others the impact of the work we do.

Over the past year, CCRC's Housing Resource Centre introduced the 'Housewarming Project' in partnership with local organizations, it's a means to provide someone moving from homelessness to housed with a starter kit of essentials for life in their new space.

In June 2021 we were able to host our first-ever virtual offering of Jukebox Mania and online auction. With the ever-entertaining assistance of host Megan Murphy, we were delighted to host just under 200 players for this evening of fun. We are so grateful for the support of our sponsors and the local businesses that donated items to our auction. JBM 2021 brought in just over \$26,000 in gross revenue.

We were fortunate to receive funding from both Canada Summer Jobs and Digital Skills for Youth to hire youth to assist with our fundraising and communications efforts. Thank you so much to Czarina Garcia and Amanda Goodall for their efforts in those roles.

Thank you also to our Fundraising and Communications Committee: Todd Barr, Alicia Doris, Sheila Ferguson and Bob Campbell for all that you do to support CCRC's fund development needs.

## Finance & Administration

This has truly been an exciting and a year full of change for CCRC. For over 65 years CCRC has served the Peterborough community in promoting individual and community well-being. There was a bustle of activity in the 2021-22 fiscal year as we settle into our one location at 540 George Street providing a hybrid model of service delivery. We also saw a major change in administering two programs at CCRC. In May 2021, we closed our Credit Counselling Program after 48 years of administering it due to changes in the industry. On January 1st, 2022 in our Housing Resource Centre Program (HRC), we transferred the rent supplement programs and housing stability funds to the City of Peterborough while Annie Hedden and her team reenvisioned the service delivery model of the HRC Program.

As you can see in the operating statement, CCRC experienced an operating surplus of \$7,737 which included the administrative transfer in City of Peterborough funding effective January 1, 2022 for the client rent subsidies as well as the reduction in Credit Counselling donation and fees due to the divestment of the program to Credit Canada Debt Solutions. As shown in the pie chart, which illustrates CCRC's operating expenses, over \$2 million of CCRC's \$2.4 million expenses (86%) went to staffing and direct client support.

CCRC's essential work could not be easily implemented without the generous support of our Donors, Community Partners and Funders. I would like to thank our donors, funders along with Community Foundation of Greater Peterborough, United Way Peterborough (Reaching Home), Canadian Women's Foundation and Pinnguaq who provided one time funding support for project based client assistance and technology maintenance which supported CCRC's mission utilizing a hybrid model of service delivery.

It was another unique and extremely busy year for the Finance and Administration team as we adjust to the financial and service changes throughout the agency and as we head into the 2022-23 fiscal year we bid farewell to Sandy Garvey (Finance Assistant) who retired in July 2022 after 6 years of dedicated service. I would like to thank Sandy, Kim Hamilton (Program and Administrative Assistant) and welcome Humay Narimanova (Payroll/Accounts Payable Coordinator) who joined us in August. With their amazing contributions and unwavering commitment to CCRC, we managed to provide continual support and assistance in our operational endeavors. I would also like to thank our Finance Committee, Allison Smith (Treasurer and Finance Committee Chair) along with committee members Emma Hillier, Charlie Martin, Tanys Howell and Kirsten Armbrust for all their insightful contributions to CCRC along with the professional support and expertise.

#### **Finance Committee**

This year for the CCRC continued to be a year of changes and transitions. The agency continued to adapt to changes due to COVID-19 impacting staff, administration of programs, and fundraising events. Nonetheless, the CCRC was successful in several applications for additional grant funding. For the year ended March 31, 2022, CCRC had an excess of revenue over expenses for the year of \$7,737 from its operations, which arose from a multitude of factors. This is a positive result given the budgeted deficit for the year of \$25,000.

The CCRC is grateful for the generosity of its staff, volunteers, donors, and community partners, who have supported the continued operations of the CCRC. It is this commitment from the community which highlights the importance of programs and services that are offered CCRC. Though the organization has encountered a number of challenges during the year and foresees additional challenges throughout the remainder of 2022 and 2023, the community support has assisted in assuring continued success.

The contributions of the Finance Committee members; Tanys Howell, Emma Hillier, Kirsten Armbrustand Charlie Martin are greatly appreciated, and especially those of Lynda Terry and the entire Finance and Administration team at CCRC.




