To increase client engagement, collaborate on counselling decisions, and enhance client outcomes, we have partnered with Greenspace, a measurement based care platform.

Professional Counselling ---

The Professional Counselling team is still working hard to address the needs of the community. The need for reasonably priced counselling services is still rising as everyday living becomes more stressful and expensive due to economic instability.

As an organization, we never stop looking for new funding to grow our services. Those receiving Ontario Works will continue to be served by our pilot program, which has been extended in collaboration with the City of Peterborough Social Services. In the City of Kawartha Lakes, we also started a pilot program that gave us the opportunity to hire two additional counsellors to provide services to individuals enrolled in the Housing program and to those receiving Ontario Works. This program was funded by the City of Kawartha Lakes. Additionally, we have grown our program in Northumberland and are now able to provide Campbellford residents in-person counselling. We can't wait to see where these new collaborations take us and provide the community with much-needed resources.

We applied for and were awarded a Bell Let's Talk grant this year. With the help of the grant, our organization was able to train additional counselors in EMDR therapy, which targets and treats PTSD. In order to improve our team's EMDR expertise, we were also able to purchase some EMDR equipment and access outside consultation. Our team's capacity to treat more clients using EMDR will, in our opinion, be of enormous help to our clients.

Additionally, we have started incorporating Measurement Based Care into our process of care. In order to increase client engagement, collaborate on counselling decisions, and enhance client outcomes, we have partnered with Greenspace, a technology that enables therapists and clients to collect data and insights. Greenspace regularly follows up with clients to find out how they are doing, gain a better understanding of their mental health, and make sure that daily events are tracked for the client's incorporation in the ongoing counselling plan. Going forward, we look forward to hearing from clients on how Greenspace affected their counselling experiences with CCRC.

Thanks to all our new funding sources we were able to grow our staff team in the last year and hire a number of Clinical Counsellors. We were able to hire a number of Clinical Counsellors. Kristen McGeown and Lisa Greci worked in the City of Kawartha Lakes, Phil Grills worked in both Campbellford and Peterborough, Viktoriia Moiseeva, Graham Petty and Rochelle Andrew saw clients in Peterborough. In addition Quinlan Clark joined the team as an Intake and Single Session Counsellor. A special thanks also goes out to our ongoing team members, Diane Caldwell, Emily Buckley and, Emily Rogers Nannarone who continue to provide services at CCRC. We are so grateful to have such a talented and diverse team of counsellors to support our community.





Housing Resource Centre

Moving in to the 2023-24 year, the HRC team had two main goals. The first was to prevent as many people as possible from experiencing homelessness. The second was to reach out to our community, get to know our community partners, and spread the word about who we are and what we do. I'm happy to report that we successfully completed both goals! As our community continues to face unprecedented challenges around housing and homelessness, the Housing Resource Centre continues to face unprecedented challenges around meeting demand for services. Just like last year, our Drop-In Housing Help service and our Eviction Prevention service were overwhelmingly busy. HRC's amazing staff team rose to the challenge and managed to save 181 at-risk tenancies. The team helped find new housing for 55 households who were homeless, or whose housing was inadequate to meet their needs. These are both incredible accomplishments that prevented vulnerable individuals and families from experiencing homelessness.

If you're reading this report, and you're a friend of HRC, you probably saw some of us out and about this past year attending team meetings, health fairs, and community events. We also hosted or co-hosted several workshops, trainings and community education events on topics related to tenants' rights and housing issues. We're really excited about all of the new connections we've made over the past year and we're looking forward to the new one's we'll make next year.

As we worked through these two goals we identified some gaps in the services we were providing and some exciting opportunities for collaboration within the community, and we pursued some new sources of funding to help us move in new directions to fill those gaps and better meet the needs of our clients and community. This resulted in the creation of two new programs at HRC, the Paralegal Program, which allowed us to hire Jessa McAuliffe, a licensed Paralegal with a background in advancing access to justice for marginalized populations, and the Housing Mediation program, which is a collaboration with the John Howard Society, and allowed Laura Greenwood to move into a new role as HRC's Manager of Community Engagement, leading the Housing Mediation project along with our Community Education project.

I'd like to thank all of the staff who have made our past year so successful: Leigh Carrod, Laura Greenwood, Kristina Thirlwell, Amanda Pratt, Andrea Holtrust, Allison McKinlay, Natasha Van Renesse, Auden Palmer, Jessa McAuliffe, and Quinlan Clark. I'd also like to extend thanks to the placement students who supported our work: Hailey Snarr, Gaganprit Kaur, Grayden Hatherly, Halona Sine, Pallvi Pallvi, Jessica Bowen, and Maddy Welsh.

We were also so excited to welcome back our legacy board members, the people who helped build our organization since it's humble beginnings in 1956.





Building on the momentum of affiliate violence against women coordinating committees across the province, PDAN organized delegations to both City of Peterborough and County of Peterborough municipal leadership and presented the collated statistics of domestic violence/intimate partner violence (DV/IPV) for our region. We did so with an ask that both councils declare DV/IPV an epidemic.

Both councils unanimously agreed.

On the heels of this, PDAN hosted 'It Happens Here' a community event that discussed the prevalence and impact of DV/IPV for people in our community. It included both recorded and live comments from survivors and those who support them.

In the spring of 2024, we completed another revision of the handbook for survivors of DV/IPV. Each of these events and activities required careful planning, including input and feedback from survivors themselves. It was a tremendous privilege to engage directly with survivor consultants on each of PDAN's planned activities over the past year, and I continue to be awed, humbled and grateful to be part of the work with both the courageous women who have shared their thoughts and expertise, and with the people who work on the front lines, helping people, mainly women, through incredibly difficult situations every day.

PDAN is comprised of 30+ organizations who support survivors of DV/IPV in some way working collaboratively to mitigate and end Gender Based Violence.

I look forward to continuing to support the community collaboration that is the cornerstone of the prevention, education and support efforts we are all undertaking.

Thank you to everyone who is part of this work and also to the Community Foundation of Greater Peterborough for funding the venue for our December 8th event.

We are delighted to share the financial summary for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2024. CCRC ended the year with a surplus of \$61,203, a testament to our careful financial management and commitment to serving our community. Almost 80% of our budget, amounting to \$1,461,246, was dedicated to salaries and direct program expenses, underscoring our focus on delivering impactful services.

This year has been exceptionally busy for the Finance and Administration team. In addition to our regular operations, we successfully implemented a major IT migration to MS365 during the fall. This project significantly improved our efficiency and was made possible by a \$30,000 grant from the Community Foundation of Greater Peterborough and a \$9,291 grant from The Peterborough Foundation. Our team worked diligently to ensure a smooth transition, and their efforts have truly paid off.

We are immensely thankful to our Finance and Administration team: Humay Narimanova (Finance and Administration Coordinator), Amanda Pratt (Program and Administration Assistant, who was seconded to the Housing Resource Centre in July 2023), Allison McKinlay, and our new Program and Administration Assistant, Caitlin Wilkins. Each team member has gone above and beyond to maintain our IT systems, ensure our building and equipment remain in good repair, ensure HR records are managed effectively, and provide accurate payroll and accounting services. They have also ensured that our clients are welcomed and treated with respect and dignity.

We would also like to extend our heartfelt thanks to the Finance Committee—Allison Smith (Treasurer), Emma Belleghem (Treasurer), Patricia Donnelly (Board Chair), Charlie Martin, and Kirsten Armbrust. Their insight and thoughtful contributions have been invaluable to the sustainability of our agency. Together, we are making a meaningful difference in our community, and we are deeply grateful for everyone's dedication and hard work.




